1. My Side of the Mountain by Jean Craighead George

Sam Gribley announces he's going to run away; and does so. After listening to countless stories of how Gribley's aren't made for the land, he runs away to his ancestors' farm up in the Catskill Mountains. Learning to survive with his wits and the help of the resources in a local library, he learns self-reliance as he fashions a home, catches his own food, and trains a falcon. A classic for thousands of young readers, this Newbery Honor book will enthrall all young girls and boys who've ever loved the woods. Recommended for ages 8 to 1, 177 pages, softcover. A 1960 Newbery Honor Book.

2. Out of the Dust by Karen Hesse

Set in the bleak times of the Dust Bowl, award-winning author Karen Hesse crafts a poetic tale of one girl's coming of age. Told in journal-like free-verse, the story of Billie Jo and the accident that would change her life is told with exquisite wording and detail. 227 pages, softcover. Newbery Award Winner.

3. Number the Stars by Lois Lowry

It is 1943 in Denmark, when ten-year-old Annemarie Johansen's family takes in her best friend Ellen and poses her as a member of the family. Ellen is Jewish and Jewish people all over the country, and Europe, are being taken by the Nazis and put into Jewish ghettos and concentration camp. This Newbery Medal winner chronicles the life of this family, the hardships they must face and the heroic decisions that they are forced to make.

4. Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett

When orphaned Mary Lennox, sickly and lonely and cross, comes to live at her uncle's great house on the Yorkshire moors, she finds it full of secrets. Down a corridor of empty rooms, she hears someone crying in the night. Outside, she meets Dickon, a magical boy who can charm the wild animals and birds or the countryside. And a robing Mary has befriended shows her the way to a walled, locked garden that has been completely for- gotten for years and years. Is everything in the garden dead, or can Mary make it grow again?

5. The Jungle Book, by Rudyard Kipling

After young Mowgli escapes the vicious jaws of the growling tiger Shere Khan, he is adopted by Father Wolf and grows up with the pack. Lovable old Baloo the Bear and Bagheera the Panther teach Mowgli the Law of the Jungle, and so his extraordinary adventures begin. Recommended for ages 8-12.

6. Sounder by William H. Armstrong

A landmark in children's literature, winner of the 1970 Newbery Medal and the basis of an acclaimed film, Sounder traces the keen sorrow and the abiding faith of a poor African-American boy in the 19th-century South. The boy's father is a sharecropper, struggling to feed his family in hard times. Night after night, he and his great coon dog, Sounder, return to the cabin empty-handed. Then one morning, almost like a miracle, a sweet-smelling ham is cooking in the family's kitchen. At last the family will have a good meal. But that night, an angry sheriff and his deputies come, and the boy's life will never be the same. Recommended for age 10 and up. The 1970 Newbery Medal winner.

One Pager Book Report

A One Pager Book Report is designed to let you show and tell about the book or novel you have read in a way that is different than your standard Book Report.

A One Pager Book Report is creative and unique, just like you are! Use color! Use color! Use color for pictures and text.

You may write in full sentences, paragraphs, bullet points, or use a powerful word to tell about your book. Use illustrations to show your understanding in a variety of ways.

Directions

On your One Pager Book Report, use this guide to help you fill in the spaces.

- Author/Title – The title and name of the author of the novel
- Main Character – Describe and/or draw the main character
- Supporting Character – Describe and/or a character that was not the main character.
- Theme – Write the theme of the novel. The theme is the message the author wanted you to learn from the novel.
- Setting – Describe and/or draw the setting.
- Connection – Describe and/draw a connection you made to the text.
- Opinion – Describe and/or draw your opinion of the novel.
- Climax – Describe the most exciting part of the novel. The action that changed the main character.
- Vocabulary – Choose three words that would be difficult for a younger student, write them, then define them with words or a drawing.
